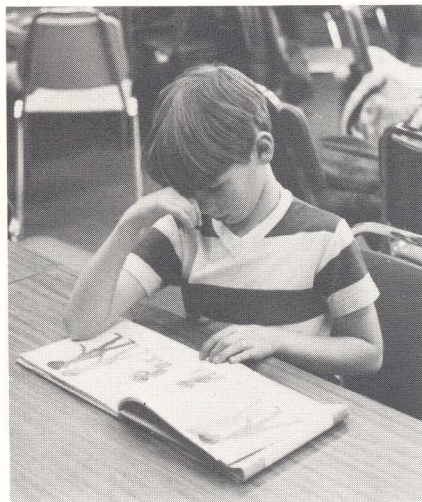

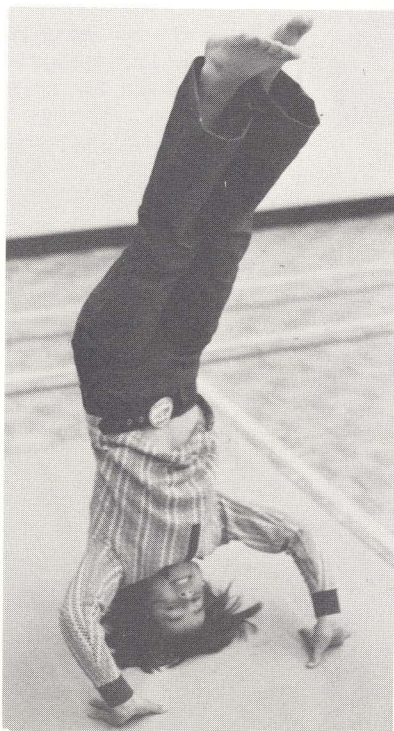

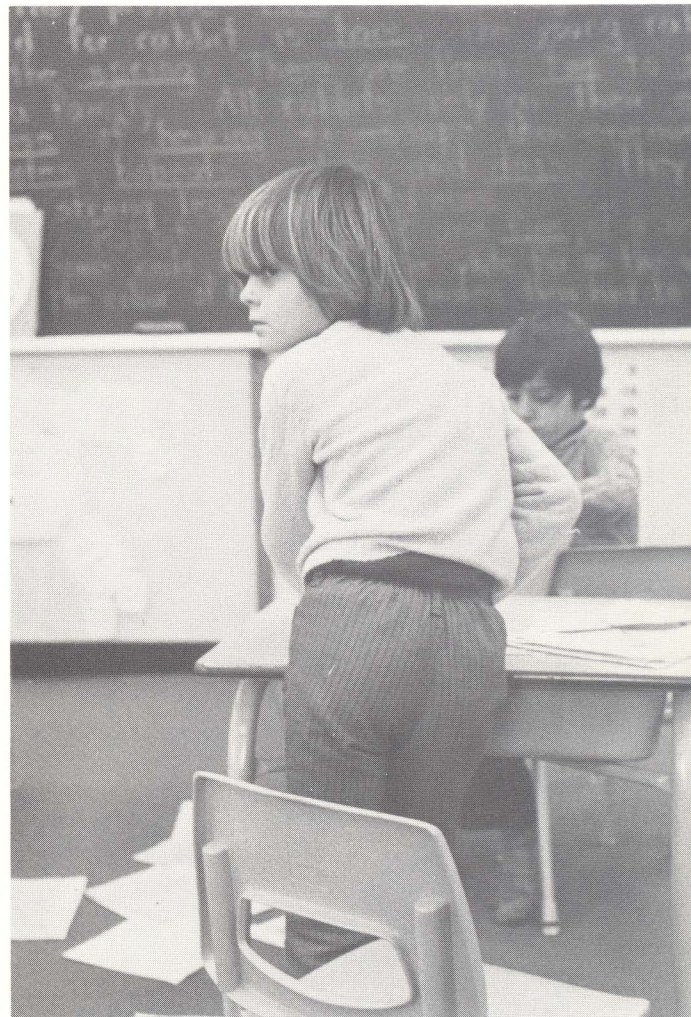

While reading "Polaris '73", each student will verbally describe one terrifying and/or demoralizing experience to another person.

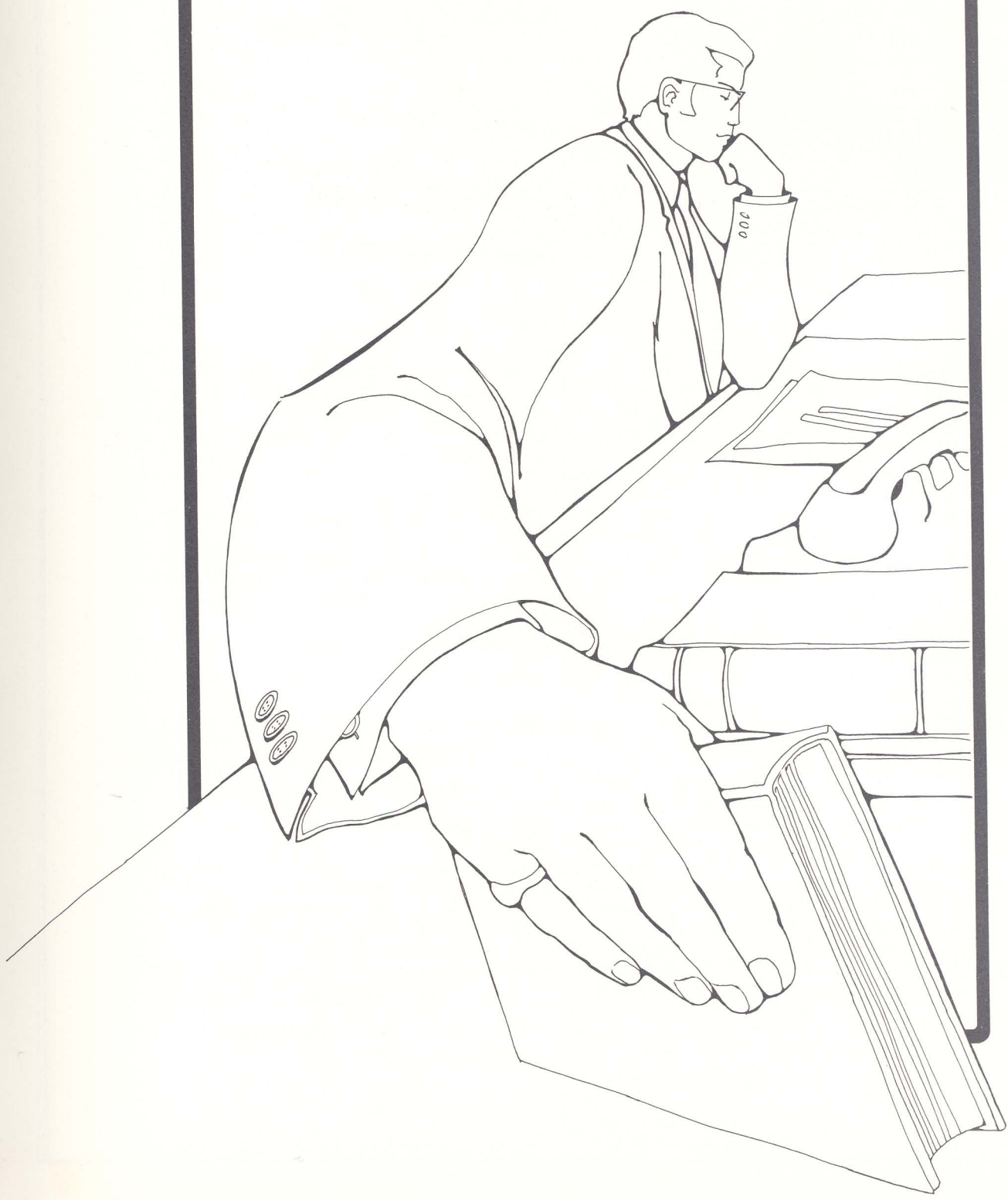
E. EVALUATION:

The members of the faculty are conscious every year of the brevity of the training period and the impossibility of creating firm friendships with so many people who would be such fine friends. We must take satisfaction in the hope that we shall have the privilege of following the careers of many of you in the profession.

We trust that by the time you read these words you will have come to understand why you were placed under such pressure by the college faculty. We know how quickly the year flies and we are very conscious of our responsibility in preparing you for a position of such trust as that of elementary school teacher.

We have enjoyed our work with you in class and we have been pleased to be with you in your games and in your social gatherings. Message from the Vice-Principal

Many years ago I was visiting in a one-room rural school just north of Toronto in the course of my duties as a music supervisor. The young lady in charge of this grade 1 to 8 classroom was exceptionally efficient as a teacher, and even more impressive in the total rapport she had with her pupils. It is not any exaggeration whatever to say that this young teacher enjoyed teaching the children, truly loved and appreciated each one of them, and received from them in return their respect, their affection, and their unqualified admiration. To get into that classroom was a delightful experience, and teaching those children an educational treat.

On one occasion I arrived early and was seated in the room awaiting the time for my own teaching. The teacher told me she was about to strap a pupil for something very serious. At the back of the room he held out his hand and received four or five strokes of the strap. The teacher then put down the strap and I was astonished to see that the boy was sobbing brokenly and had put his arms around her waist and was clinging to her, while she was comforting him. Some time after this extraordinary scene she told me quite simply that this happened every time she had to use the strap, though she rarely had to do so.

It is not my intention to debate here the merits of corporal punishment. At that time and place it was normal. Instead, I would challenge every graduating teacher of the class of seventy-three to go beyond the dictates of efficient and well-planned teaching, to transcend the good methods and organization which are so necessary, and climb to the broad and sunlit upland of that greater human relationship where the influence of a devoted teacher on the pupil's personality creates a profound effect upon his deepest attitudes and infuses the wellsprings of his life forever after.

To the nineteenth century American educator Mark Hopkins has been attributed the saying, "The ideal college consists of a log of wood with an instructor at one end and a student at the other." His friends modified this dictum by putting Mark Hopkins at the instructor's end of the log, implying that no great equipment and buildings were necessary if you had a Mark Hopkins kind of man to instruct you.

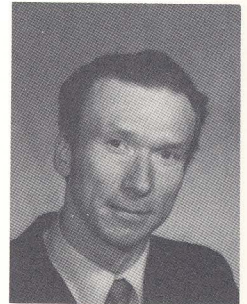

May you transcend each day's multifarious demands and activities by reaching out to the children to reassure, encourage, arouse and inspire them, that they may deal confidently with this new and awesome world into which they have been born.
